


### HOLY WEEK

If churches, crosses, statues of Christ, statues of the Virgin, parades with multitudes of people could make a week Holy--then Holy Week in the Latin American countries would indeed be Holy.

The statue of Christ seen in the upper corner of this paper is located near the city of Cali and overlooks the capital city of the Valle on the western coast of Colombia. It looks impressive and symbolically it would seem to mean that Christ is taking special care of the city.

Unfortunately, however, if the statue could see--it would see a city with many churches and multitudes of people who are almost in complete ignorance of the Word of God. Christ as a statue in the church and upon the mountain side they know well, but Christ in the heart--the indwelling Christ, the living Christ, the empowering Christ--not yet.

But there is hope. The people in darkness are seeing a Light. Every year many new people are beginning to understand—and with their understanding comes a new life in which Jesus—the living Christ—becomes a Saviour and Lord.

### SCHOOL BEGAN IN FEBRUARY

Vacation time for many Colombian children ends in February. For American children accustomed to door-to-door service and many conveniences, it may not be easy to comprehend just what is means for many Latin Americans to attain an education.

For many it means a sacrifice of the small earnings to pay even the low tuition of 80 cents (U.S.) Others in our schools walk long distances, for an hour or more, some over rugged paths, rain or shine, to be able to attend.

But it's worthwhile to them and to us. So we have three schools operating this year. The school in Cachipay in its 15th year has 109 children, and the schools in La Mesa and Anolaima each have about 35 children.

School here is a transforming experience—much appreciated, much sought after, and desperately needed. It is a wonderful experience to be able to help these little children into a New World.

#### THE CHRISTIAN TEACHER

I watched her standing at the door of the classroom. Her weary eyes were following each one of the pupils as they disappeared to different parts of the Mission Compound.

Others went to ask Mr. Stucky for a grape-fruit to satisfy their appetites until supper time. Two girls made their way to the clinic to see the nurse, Miss Janet. Teresa had tried to be brave in class all afternoon, but she did have an ear-ache. Wouldn't the nurse please do something to relieve her pain. And Gloria...it was obvious that she was the third one to come down with the chicken pox...

The teacher was soberly watching her

pupils as they were disappearing into all directions. Some quite well dressed and others almost ragged. Some looked strong and healthy, others were the picture of undernourishment. Some looked happy and carefree, others looked a bit sad and even worried.



The teacher went back into the classroom to pick up her books. She seemed to feel a divine presence in the room. The Great Teacher..."Lord," she prayed, "remove from me this burden---help me to forget these little ones and the terrible struggle they have in this world. Am I the keeper of their souls? Must I always carry this responsibility for them? Did I make a mistake when I decided to teach them?"

He who carried the crown of thorns upon His brow replied to her..."I know all about your burden. My eyes have seen your cares and your responsibilities."

"But Lord...many others like me are without responsibilities—it does not matter to them that so many Colombian children are walking the streets, becoming delinquents, perishing in darkness. Must I put forth this effort... Yes, I must, but help me, Lord."

The Master replied: "Cast your burden upon me. My effort was greater than yours. I went the way of the Cross."

"Yes, Lord in my own strength, I cannot teach them. Help me...they are yours."

A supernatural power of love filled the heart of the teacher. "Forgive, dear Lord, forgive. Because of my love for Thee, I shall be a servant to these, your little ones."

Happy, the Lord replied, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my prethren, ye have done it unto Me."

# WINTER VOLUNTARY SERVICE WORKERS

We recently said "Good-bye" to two couples of VS'ers---Mr. and Mrs. Joe Deckert and Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Deckert. They came in December and left in February.

The Deckerts came from their respective farms in Montana. Yes - the men were brothers. They left the cold snowy and windy weather of Montana's winter and spent  $2\frac{1}{2}$  months in the tropical weather of Colombia. Their

farms were left in care of friends and they came to spend in Colombia a "Christian Vacation" of service to the Lord.

They started their work here by budding hundreds of orange trees. They worked hardand did well. When they got tired of budding trees, they started to paint buildings that had not been painted for years and were in desperate need. Then it was discovered that termites had eaten up the roof of the girls dormitory - so they helped to put on a new roof. A couple of horses of the school became sick with "mumps". So the Montana farmers nurtured them back to health. The wives cooked, sewed, painted, cleaned, re-made furniture and were a marvelous help to their husbands and to the Mission. They were also good company and an inspiration when things were rough.

The VS'ers learned first hand some of the problems and heartaches of mission work. They saw a foreign country and observed how others live. They saw the miserable effects of poverty and lack of education. They saw what it meant to live without Christ.

Now they are back home again. They will tell others in the home church about life on the mission field. They can now pray with understanding. Do you think they spent their time and money well?

#### ARTHUR KEISER FAMILY RETURNS TO STATES

It was with deep regret and sorrow that the Mission family and friends bade farewell to the Keiser family on March 23. Recently she relates, "We no sooner got home than sparks started to fly from the high tension wires in front of our house and along the other street. It set something on fire and it fell in our patio not too far from the tank of gas, all too close anyway and whatever it we 11 was sparkled for a little while. We went

to the door only to find people staring at the sparks and no one seemingly doing anything." Of her little light plant she writes: "Now the motor won't start for a man or for a woman. So tomorrow I'll have to go man-chasing again. These men are so hard to find on the job.

"So you see, life here is most interesting. One never knows what will be next."
